** Situated on a hilltop with a panoramic view of the Grand Monadnock, the Cathedral of the Pines is a breathtaking open-air cathedral and meeting space on 236 acres. Our historic monuments honor the service of American men and women—both military and civilian. We welcome visitors from all over the world to participate in our events and to explore the extraordinary sanctuary grounds, meditate in outdoor chapels and gardens, and learn our history.*

**** New Ipswich and lunch**

"As of 2000, there were 4,289 people, 1,350 households, and 1,089 families residing in the town. Racial breakdown shows 19.7% were of [Finnish descent](#). "New Ipswich was granted in 1735 to 60 inhabitants of Ipswich, Massachusetts, from whence the name is derived, by Colonial Governor Jonathan Belcher and the General Court (Assembly) of Massachusetts."

**** Harrisville** <http://www.harrisville.com/>

Harrisville is a unique, preserved nineteenth-century mill town located in the Monadnock Region of southern New Hampshire. It was named for Milan Harris, whose stone and brick Cheshire Mills operated until 1970, but looked virtually unchanged since the mid-19th century.

Today, the Cheshire Mills are protected as part of the Harrisville Historic District, a National Historic Landscape which includes the center of town. With its red brick buildings and mills reflected in Harrisville Pond and Canal, the village is frequently photographed as an iconic example of picturesque old New England.

It is also home to Harrisville Design, <http://www.harrisville.com>. Harrisville Designs offers products for the weaving and knitting enthusiast. Their products are made in their mills in Harrisville, NH. They are a small family owned and operated business, which believes that quality should not be compromised for even the smallest product. Harrisville Designs was started in 1971 as an effort to preserve and help re-establish the economic vitality of the historic 18th century textile village of Harrisville, NH. It is recognized as the only textile village of that era in America that survives in its original form.
